# **FY22 Highlights**

#### **Launched Workforce IT Training**

In 2021, Britepaths and the Financial Empowerment Center at South County expanded our Workforce Development offerings with two free Information Technology certification training courses to give Northern Virginia residents experiencing barriers to employment the skills and resources they need to obtain better-paying jobs in a field where employees are in high demand. Through a collaboration with AWS re/Start, we began offering AWS Cloud Computing and IT Fundamentals training, and also launched a Google-IT Comp TIA A+ training program. Thirty clients graduated from the training programs in FY22. We began building relationships with local technology companies to foster employment opportunities for our graduates, and continue to welcome these partnerships. Grants from Truist Foundation and the Weller Family Foundation helped us launch our IT offerings.

# Administered Substantial Pandemic Relief Funding


Britepaths is honored to have earned a reputation in Fairfax County and Virginia for efficiently and effectively disbursing food and financial assistance to families and has been entrusted with the distribution of millions of dollars of relief funds since the start of the pandemic. In FY22, we distributed \$5,183,432 granted through Fairfax County to provide rent and/or utility assistance to help 592 families stay in their homes. The County has additionally granted us \$540,076 to

continue emergency assistance for rent, utilities and food for FY23 and FY24.

Through a special Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) grant of nearly \$200,000 from the Commonwealth of Virginia, we received support for our Food Support and Food Bridge programs, assisting 259 families, and for several different Workforce Development programs, helping 394 families to stabilize and improve their employment prospects. The Junior League of Washington helped with emergency food; car repair and other needs were served with the help of Cloudbreak Foundation, St. Mary of Sorrows Catholic Church in Fairfax, the Community Foundation of Northern Virginia, and Transurban Foundation.

# Expanded Financial Empowerment Partnerships

Britepaths and the Financial Empowerment Center at South County continued to primarily offer our programming virtually in FY22, which provided opportunities to expand ongoing partnerships, engage with new partners and reach out to new communities. We're now offering services in Arlington and the City of Alexandria, providing food entrepreneur consulting and helping new immigrants understand U.S. financial and workforce customs. Enhanced partnerships with Northern Virginia Family Service and Legal Services of Northern Virginia, and new partnerships with AHC, Inc., Al-Hijrah Islamic Center, the Washington Forrest Foundation and the City of Alexandria have helped make this expanded reach possible.



#### Who We Are

Britepaths is in our 38th year of providing help and hope to Northern Virginia residents in crisis. We are a dedicated leader in developing sustainable solutions that meet the needs of low-income working families through emergency assistance, financial empowerment, workforce development and one-on-one mentoring.

In FY22, we continued to assist community members thrown into crisis by the pandemic and rising prices by providing food and financial assistance to help them stay in their homes. Through our virtual Financial Empowerment and Workforce Development offerings—including new IT job training programs—we helped them assess their situations and plan for brighter futures. Additionally, our Board and staff


further developed and refined our Diversity, Equity and Inclusion goals and initiatives to ensure our help is best situated to meet all our clients' needs.

# **FY22 Impact**

Although the nation got a powerful dose of hope when the COVID-19 vaccines were released, the stresses of the pandemic, combined with widespread job losses and economic disruption, continued to weigh down the recovery for thousands of Northern Virginia residents. Hard-won household reserves were depleted, struggling businesses folded, and people who had always managed to make ends meet were compelled to look for help. In FY22 Britepaths rallied its resources and volunteers to serve **8,993 area households**, boosting the wellbeing of **12,425 residents**. Our Stability programs helped people stay fed and housed through a crisis; our Resilience programs gave them ways to improve their financial and professional position moving forward; and our Supports for Children helped lighten the burden of worry and need borne by some of the most vulnerable members of our community.





